

Response to Spatial Development Strategy consultation December 2020

The Bristol Walking Alliance is a consortium of organisations and individuals campaigning to improve Bristol's walking environment. We want to create an environment for pedestrians that is welcoming, safe, convenient and inclusive.

Introduction

1. The Bristol Walking Alliance (BWA) welcomes this consultation. We have found it difficult to respond using just the questionnaire survey because of our specialist interest in walking and our focus on Bristol. Our survey answers are annexed, but we thought it might be helpful to set out our main concerns separately.

Priority 1: reduced car use

- 2. Question 2 in the survey rightly links car use and climate change. But car use needs to be reduced for many other reasons: for pedestrians cars bring danger, poor air quality, obstructed pavements, noise and visual intrusion. Driving is bad for people's health. Road building is destructive.
- 3. We argued in 2016 for sustainable transport to be the top priority in the emerging Joint Spatial Plan (JSP): it remains our priority now. This requires a settlement pattern throughout the WECA area that encourages the use of trains, trams, light rail and buses for long journeys, and cycling and walking for short ones. We welcome the suggestions in question 9 that parking might be restricted and more low traffic roads created but those are ideas that tend to transfer the problems rather than removing them if the alternatives to car use are unattractive.

Priority 2: Green Belt review

- 4. Making protection of the Green Belt top priority in the Joint Spatial Plan produced a settlement pattern so unsatisfactory that planning inspectors rejected the Plan. That mistake must not be repeated: 48% of the WECA area should not be regarded as inviolable when there is such an urgent need for land to be developed. The Green Belt assessment prepared for the JSP showed that much of the Green Belt was failing to serve even most Green Belt purposes. Most Green Belt land is of no value to walkers or to the public as a whole.
- 5. We suggest that the three WECA authorities and North Somerset review Green Belt boundaries urgently. The review will need to follow the advice in the National Planning Policy Framework (para 138) to give first consideration to land well served by public transport. The advice continues: " [Plans] should also set out ways in which the impact of removing land from the Green Belt can be offset through

compensatory improvements to the environmental quality and accessibility of remaining Green Belt land".

6. The Green Belt guidance published in July 2019 included 'new or enhanced walking or cycling routes' among the improvements that might be sought. We see such routes as important links to other forms of sustainable transport, as well as encouraging walking in its own right.

Priority 3: 15 minute neighbourhoods

- 7. Question 3 asks what features and facilities are most important to access within easy reach (15 minute walk) of people's homes. This is an important question if people are to leave home on foot on most trips rather than in a car. We do not think it realistic for them to undertake all journeys on foot specialist services, secondary schools and employment require larger catchment areas but proximity to efficient public transport could make car use unnecessary.
- 8. In compiling our list, we have taken account of the limitations of the planning system. The system can and should ensure that everyone has easy access to the following:
 - outside public space with a children's playground and seats for social interaction
 - accessible green space
 - attractive and safe walking routes
 - attractive and safe cycling routes
 - bus/tram stop/station for good public transport to other essential facilities.

Planners should also seek as far as is possible to ensure the following are within walking distance:

- shop for daily essentials, with a post office counter
- nursery and primary school
- indoor space for social interaction
- doctor and dentist

Priority 4: liveable/low traffic neighbourhoods

9. We would like the strategy to endorse the concept of liveable/low traffic neighbourhoods which have been successfully introduced elsewhere in the country. Limiting vehicular through-routes in certain neighbourhoods and making public realm and other environmental improvements, makes neighbourhoods more attractive for walking and many other aspects of life.

One idea that has emerged from lockdown is the '15 minute neighbourhood', where the things that you need are within a walkable distance from home. This principle could apply to a town, city neighbourhood, suburb or village.

- local shops, schools and services
- green spaces, planting and trees
- places for social interaction and play
- places to work

- space for walking and cycling
- well designed buildings

BWA answer:
